Founder's Note

FY 24–25 was a rebirth for us. Possibly the most important year since we started the organisation. We failed, we learnt, and strongly lived this loop. We had volunteers who volunteered for 100+ hours in a few months, and that too with a smile, which was such an inspiring emotion for me. Isn't the success of an organisation decided when the team becomes more passionate than the founder. It was always a dream, I saw it with open eyes this financial year.

Quantitatively, our volunteers tripled and volunteering hours scaled to 5 times crossing 30000 hours. We were able to frame our own Measurement & Evaluation (M&E), which is such an important step for measuring long term impact so that we can make this a part of the education curriculum. The result of M&E was above average, and for a volunteer organisation, it was appreciated by veterans in the field.

This year was also marked as a year of scaling and getting incubated by Eivolve (India's largest volunteer organisation). Only 6 organisations were selected in this incubation out of 130 organisations.

This year seems like a birth and FY 25–26 will be the one where we start taking our steps and soon we will run, not like a sprint, but like a marathon.

Going deeper in our work has always been our priority.

Highlights



1. We designed our own Monitoring and Evaluation tools, to measure impact.
2. Campus ambassador program is now live and we will be starting sourcing for the same.
3. Trained 100+ principles of Mathura through DCPO Mathura.
4. Collaborated with SCERT to train 1000+ teachers of Chandigarh
5. Collaborated with Outlawed India for Legal Internship
6. Pilot for legal response team has started, and we will have legal response team of volunteer in FY 25-26
7. We now hold DIAMOND Batch on Vidyanjali (an initiative under Ministry of Education)
8. Mental health toolkit for survivors to battle urgency.



We analyzed data from 500 children (Grades 3–5) across 4 schools to assess their understanding of CSA before and after our sessions.

Before our sessions (October 2024):

- 77% had little to no understanding
- 21% had a basic idea
- 2% had a good understanding




4 months later (February 2025):

- Poor understanding dropped to 44%
- Average understanding rose to 47%
- 9% reached good/excellent
- Overall knowledge scores improved from 44% to 68%

Children workshop feedback: (Data set of 1857 children over 12 schools)

- 84 percent of children learned something new
- 75 percent of children felt more confident about their body
- 73 per cent of children felt their concerns were addressed.



HOPE Program Insights

Listening circle evaluation

1. 86% People in our listening circles feel less anxiety with an average reduction of 18%.
2. 75% People in our listening circles feel more belongingness with an average increase of 22%.
3. 62% People in our listening circles feel more hope with an average increase of 11%.
4. 64% of people had higher levels of awareness about “How to Communicate with a Survivor Empathetically?”
5. 82% people in support group agree that they feel safe and belonged in the support group



Therapies sponsored for 2 survivors.

100% of 16 therapy sessions received a 5/5 satisfaction rating, with the first participant reporting they felt heard, experienced positive emotional and coping improvements, and found therapy goals aligned with their personal growth.

We evaluated the efficiency of the survivors in our support groups about how they can handle triggers. Here are the scores:

Very Low (Below 30)	0
Low (30-40)	10 members
Average (40-60)	33 members
High (60-70)	8 members
Very High (Above 70)	1 member
